IN-TEXT CITATIONS

Short quotations

According to Squires (2018), "In 1988, 44% of African American students attended majority-White schools; 20% do so today" (p. 40)

Long quotations

Squires's (2018) study found the following:

The federal government spends \$36 billion annually on housing assistance for households earning up to \$40,000 a year while spending \$43.9 billion (primarily via various mortgage related and capital gains tax breaks) on households earning \$200,000 or more. Annual federal housing spending per household is \$1,529 for households making less than \$20,000 compared to \$6,076 per household for those earning \$200,000 or more (p. 70)

Long quotations (more than 40 words) should be typed in a separate block indented by 0.5 inches from both sides.

A work by two authors

A work by three to five authors

Dong, Lei, Mendes, and So (2020) demonstrated the optimal criterion stability.

A work by six or more authors
